C600 STATEMENT OF WORK (DESC JAN 1987)

A. The contractor shall provide unarmed security guards at the Defense Energy Support Center, Aerospace Energy at the following location:

Building 1621
1014 Billy Mitchell Blvd
San Antonio, Texas 78226

B. Hours of coverage: Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, 0545 hours through 1815 hours.

C. Period of Performance: May 25, 2009 through May 24, 2010.

E. Tasks/job description items to be performed by security personnel:

1. The primary objective is to provide a safe and secure environment. The security guard will provide foot patrol for the exterior of the building and parking lot adjacent to the facility for the duration of each shift, 0545 to 1815 daily, at building 1621. The security guard **MUST BE VISIBLE** at all times to passers-by to provide a visual presence needed for the purpose of deterrence. The security guard **WILL NOT** conduct surveillance from inside a vehicle. Responsibility will be to deter, respond, and report any situation that may arise. The security guard will primarily patrol the building exterior and parking lots adjacent to the facilities. On a daily basis, and at the end of the shift, the security guard will check the interior of the main building, building 1621, to ensure all personnel have left for the day and check all exterior doors to ensure they are secure.

2. The security guard will check all vehicles for proper parking permits and validate license plates with RRP vehicle log to be provided to the security guard at check-in time at the initial start of the contract and then provided updated vehicle logs as necessary.

3. The security guard will provide escorts to employee vehicles if requested.

4. The security guard will have a means of communication with government personnel during hours of coverage; this can be accomplished by using a cell phone or an alternate means of communication.

5. All incidents will be reported and documented on the Incident Report Form and turned in on the day of the incident to David White, DESC-RRP, at the address below. The Incident Report Form may be in the company's format. Local authorities are to be contacted as needed.

6. Additional staffing of security services for Special Events, Major Sales, etc., will be handled on an as-needed basis per location and event.

7. A guard shack may be installed in the parking lot at some point during the Period of Performance. If completed and operational, security personnel will have access to monitor on-site security cameras. In the interim, in the event of **severe** inclement weather, the security guard will seek temporary shelter within building 1621 to protect himself or herself.

F. In addition, all security personnel are required to perform the following administrative tasks:

1. Perform an interior walk through of the building upon arrival and turn on lights as needed. Develop and follow a daily checklist, which will require daily sign-in at start of shift and sign-out at end of shift, additionally, the checklist will include actions to be taken with the DESC-RRP POC. This checklist should also include a pass down section used to communicate any issues at shift change. Include any pass down or information given and/or received from Port Authority Security, City of San Antonio Police, and/or Military Police. A consolidated checklist signed by all security personnel will be turned in weekly to DESC-RRP.

2. Completing the online Anti-Terrorism Level I Training. .
